Rogue Community College Hires Men's Soccer Coach



GRANTS PASS/MEDFORD, Ore.--Rogue Community College has hired a head coach for men's soccer, the College announced today.

Greg Millick, an experienced player and coach, will lead the Ospreys in competition in the Northwest Athletic Conference (NWAC) in the fall of 2015. He is already recruiting players.

"I am looking to bring players into the RCC program to achieve excellence on the field and in the classroom," Coach Millick said, adding that as a former junior college player and student, he knows how important it is that RCC can provide players the opportunity to earn a degree, transfer to a university, and play at the university level. "I am very excited to be joining RCC as the program's first head coach. I want to thank the athletic director, Kori Bieber, and the committee for this incredible opportunity."

Coach Millick rounds out the roster of RCC's first coaching staff. "I am proud of the exceptional coaches who will be leading the Ospreys," said Kori Ebenhack Bieber, athletic director for RCC. "Greg and the entire athletic staff believe RCC is the best first choice for our local student athletes, and Greg understands that developing them is a holistic endeavor."

Originally from Windsor, Cal., Coach Millick played soccer at Sonoma County SOL-FC, 2006; Gonzaga University (club soccer) from 2006-2008; Whatcom College, Bellingham, Wash., in 2010, 2011; Spokane Spiders FC (now Spokane Shadow) in 2010; and the Abbotsford Mariners in Abbotsford, British Columbia in 2011.

Coach Millick was club and technical director for Diablos FC, in Kansas City, Mo. in 2015 and head coach for Boys Diablos FC from 2013-2015. He was also head coach for boys' soccer at Van Horn High School in Independence, Mo. from 2013-14 with a combined record of 28-18-1. The team was 2014 district champions and 2014 Class 3A state quarter finalists. In 2012, Coach Millick coached the Northeast High School boys' soccer team in Kansas City, Mo. to an 18-5-2 record. They were district finalists.

As a player, coach, and person Millick believes one must strive to be the best he can be at everything he does. "When I was a player, every training session was a time to focus and strive to get better, every touch of the ball," he says. "As a coach I try to push this ideal to all of my players. This is a process that brings physical elements, mental elements, and a drive together in a hardworking effort to achieve excellence. We never stop working and growing as players, as coaches, or as people."

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
