
And it's not just about within our own departments and groups. More importantly, it's interdepartmentally that we really need to step up our game.




Bullet Points from the Jan. 25th **Faculty Senate Meeting**

* The importance of communication was emphasized. This was the theme of the recent World Cafés. Leo observed that we don't always communicate broadly here at RCC. Marina had some nice blurbs about communication on the white board. Never assume your message was received. Requesting confirmation and thanking people is a great thing. Gratitude goes miles. Follow-up is not nagging if you do it right.

* Leo addressed the proposals in the air for community college state funding for the next biennium. \$640 million is probably overly optimistic. \$542 million is probably overly pessimistic. \$570 million is what the community colleges had in the last biennium and would not cover cost increases. There have been no formal RIF conversations yet. About RIF's, Leo said, "From my



perspective, that's the last alternative."


- * We discussed Leo's proposed revisions to the professional development forms.
